I. Opening Remarks

Marisa mentioned the instructions for enabling translation services.

Israel Hernandez welcomed everyone and mentioned the recording of consent guidelines to everyone in the meeting. He commented they had reached a quorum.

Eric Reyes commented he attended the Salton Sea summit where the findings presented were interesting and scary. He said he's since found a sense of urgency.

II. Public Comment Period

There were no public comments.

III. Discussion / Information Items

2024 CAMP Draft, Kaitlyn Elkind; Ramboll.

Sergio Cabañas asked if the comments from APCD were incorporated in the draft they received.

Christian Torres suggested adding more context on alerts for air quality episodes. He asked if SCS Engineers had previous experience working with AQ View because the data flow could be tricky. He suggested editing out any IVAN Monitor references in the draft because the North End communities do not use them.

Sergio Cabañas asked if they would be getting another draft that included the comments from the meeting.

Israel Hernandez mentioned sharing another draft during the December meeting was possible.

Sergio Cabañas said he was referring to receiving a draft before the December meeting so they can have time to review it.

Israel Hernandez confirmed they can do that.

Christian Torres said he would like to see a mention of when they would be adopting a notification system.

Israel Hernandez suggested a meeting between the first and second quarters of 2025 to establish something.

Sergio Valenzuela commented the QuantAQ notification system was aimed at repairs and maintenance issues. He said that they are currently reviewing public notifications.

Eric Reyes asked the committee if they should move forward with **Christian Torres'** recommendation.

Sergio Cabañas mentioned that having his comment on the draft should be enough. After reviewing the updated draft, he said they could recommend it during the December meeting.

Christian Torres asked if the Brawley Main St. station would be moving locations.

Israel Hernandez said there was no indication that the monitor would be relocated.

Kaitlyn Elkind noted that two more monitors have been installed and will be added to Table 9.1.

Israel Hernandez mentioned the monitors were located near the regulatory monitor in Brawley and the other one in Wiest Lake.

Kaitlyn Elkind commented the text would update to reflect the new locations.

Sergio Valenzuela mentioned the Brawley Fire Department was the only pending installation.

Christian Torres asked what the courthouse monitor would be used for.

Sergio Valenzuela commented that the monitor was located there due to community concerns around Gonzalez Park. He said it would be used for collocation and as a community monitor.

Christian Torres asked if there was a way to do a regional calibration.

Sergio Valenzuela mentioned they would be doing regional calibration with the Brawley and Westmorland locations.

Israel Hernandez reminded the committee they would send the updated CAMP draft before their next meeting.

Imperial County AB 617 North-End Corridor Open Discussion, ICAPCD.

Sergio Cabañas asked **Sergio Valenzuela** if he could give an update on the monitor installation status.

Sergio Valenzuela mentioned they have installed fourteen out of the fifteen monitors installed. He said **Jose Landeros** has been reviewing some of the data they have received and mentioned they have seen certain trends and patterns in their reviews. He said he has been getting more comments from the site hosts and the public about possible projects they could do near the monitoring areas. He commented that Magnolia has asked for a paving project in their facility. He added that he noticed that the Calipatria Airport has a lot of loose sand and dirt.

Sergio Cabañas asked if he could share the comments, he has been getting with APCD and the committee.

Israel Hernandez commented that he received a call from a concerned citizen about a lot of dust in the air after a high wind event. He mentioned he invited him to join the meeting so he could voice his concerns.

Sergio Cabañas said he agrees that there are a lot of areas that could benefit from paving projects.

Israel Hernandez mentioned their programs bring the community's concerns to light and let the CSC committee vote on projects that aim to fix the air quality issues in the community.

John Hernandez asked if they should consider moving the courthouse monitor to the south due to the region's expansion.

Sergio Valenzuela commented they installed a monitor on Malan Street and another one near the hospital south of Thorton Park that covers the southern area.

IV. Agency Updates

Israel Hernandez said they would share the documents from Ramboll with the committee as soon as they received them.

V. Topics on the Agenda and Date for the Next Meeting.

Israel Hernandez commented that their next meeting was scheduled for December 16th. He said they would be sharing a draft for the CERP so they could review it with the CSC committee. He reminded the committee that the CERP and the CAMP needed to be approved before February 2025 and urged them to review the documents as soon as they received them.

Christian Torres asked if the February 2025 deadline was for the Air District and board to approve the documents.

Israel Hernandez confirmed it was for the board to approve the documents.

Christian Torres said their deadline should be before that.

VI. Final Observations / Closing

Israel Hernandez reminded the committee their following meeting would be via Zoom.

Borrador del CAMP 2024, Kaitlyn Elkind; Ramboll.

Sergio Cabañas preguntó si los comentarios de APCD fueron incorporados en el borrador que recibieron.

Christian Torres sugirió agregar más contexto sobre las alertas de episodios de calidad del aire. Preguntó si los ingenieros de SCS tenían experiencia previa trabajando con AQ View porque el flujo de datos podría ser complicado. Sugirió eliminar cualquier referencia de IVAN Monitor en el borrador porque las comunidades de North End no las usan.

Sergio Cabañas preguntó si recibirán otro borrador que incluyera los comentarios de la reunión.

Israel Hernández mencionó que era posible compartir otro borrador antes de la reunión de diciembre.

Sergio Cabañas dijo que se refería a recibir un borrador antes de la reunión de diciembre para que puedan tener tiempo de revisarlo.

Israel Hernández confirmó que pueden hacer eso.

Christian Torres dijo que le gustaría que se mencionara cuándo adoptarán un sistema de notificación.

Israel Hernández sugirió una reunión entre el primer y segundo trimestre de 2025.

Sergio Valenzuela comentó que el sistema de notificación QuantAQ estaba dirigido a problemas de reparación y mantenimiento. Dijo que actualmente se encuentran revisando las notificaciones públicas.

Christian Torres preguntó si la estación de Brawley Main St. se mudaría de ubicación.

Israel Hernández dijo que no había indicios de que el monitor fuese reubicado.

Kaitlyn Elkind observó que se han instalado dos monitores más que se agregarán a la Tabla 9.1.

Israel Hernández mencionó que los monitores estaban ubicados cerca del monitor regulatorio en Brawley y el otro en Wiest Lake.

Kaitlyn Elkind comentó que el texto se actualizará para reflejar las nuevas ubicaciones.

Sergio Valenzuela mencionó que el Departamento de Bomberos de Brawley era la única instalación pendiente.

Christian Torres preguntó para qué se utilizaría el monitor del juzgado.

Sergio Valenzuela comentó que el monitor se ubicó allí debido a preocupaciones de la comunidad alrededor del Parque González. Dijo que se utilizaría para la colocación y también como monitor comunitario.

Christian Torres preguntó si había una manera de hacer una calibración regional.

Sergio Valenzuela mencionó que estarían haciendo una calibración regional con las ubicaciones de Brawley y Westmorland.

Israel Hernández le recordó al comité que enviarán el borrador CAMP actualizado antes de su próxima reunión.

Dijo que **José Landeros** ha estado revisando algunos de los datos que han recibido y mencionó que han visto ciertas tendencias y patrones en sus revisiones. Dijo que ha estado recibiendo más comentarios de los anfitriones de las ubicaciones y del público sobre posibles proyectos que podrían realizar cerca de las áreas de monitoreo. Comentó que Magnolia ha solicitado un proyecto de pavimentación en sus instalaciones. Agregó que notó que el Aeropuerto Calipatria tiene mucha arena suelta y tierra.

Sergio Cabañas preguntó si podía compartir los comentarios que ha estado recibiendo con APCD y el comité.

Israel Hernández comentó que recibió una llamada de un ciudadano quejándose del exceso de polvo en el aire después de un evento de fuertes vientos. Mencionó que lo invitó a unirse a la reunión para poder expresar sus preocupaciones.

Sergio Cabañas dijo que está de acuerdo en que hay muchas áreas que podrían beneficiarse de los proyectos de pavimentación.

John Hernández preguntó si deberían considerar trasladar el monitor del tribunal al sur debido a la expansión de la región.

Sergio Valenzuela comentó que instalaron un monitor en Malan Street y otro cerca del hospital al sur de Thorton Park que cubre el área sur.

Facility Prioritization Score

Low Priority

- Prioritization score below 1 in a million
- No further action unless permit modification.

Intermediate Priority

- Prioritization score between 1 & 10 in a million
- Entered into emissions inventory, reporting every 4 years.

High Priority

- Prioritization score higher than 10 in a million
- Annual emissions reporting, HRA submission required before issuing permit, and AB 2588 fees


Health Risk Assessment (HRA)

- Estimates chance a person will experience a health effect from a toxic air contaminants
- Based on the proposed project potential emission
- Uses methodology establish by California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment based on the different scenarios of human exposure. ie: near by residents, children, and workers
- HRA Process estimates potential health risk and involves:



Hazard Identification

Identifies health problems and potency of toxic air contaminants



Dose-Response

Accounts for the increased chances of having health effects when pollutant levels are higher



Exposure

Estimates the amount of time a person could be exposed to toxic air contaminants



Sensitivity

Accounts for children being more sensitive to the health effects of air toxics

Public Notification

- Required when Health Risk Assessment (HRA) shows significant risk
- Mandated under H&SC §44362 (b).

California Code, Health and Safety Code - HSC § 44362

Current as of January 01, 2023 | Updated by [FindLaw Staff](#)

(a) Taking the comments of the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment into account, the district shall approve or return for revision and resubmission and then approve, the health risk assessment within one year of receipt. If the health risk assessment has not been revised and resubmitted within 60 days of the district's request of the operator to do so, the district may modify the health risk assessment and approve it as modified.

(b) Upon approval of the health risk assessment, the operator of the facility shall provide notice to all exposed persons regarding the results of the health risk assessment prepared pursuant to [Section 44361](#) if, in the judgment of the district, the health risk assessment indicates there is a significant health risk associated with emissions from the facility. If notice is required under this subdivision, the notice shall include only information concerning significant health risks attributable to the specific facility for which the notice is required. Any notice shall be made in accordance with procedures specified by the district.

- ▶ Imperial County Board of Supervisors approved updated Charter & Roster on January 28, 2025
- ▶ Members have been removed per the last Charter's attendance policy
- ▶ Attendance policy was updated in the Charter
 - ▶ Intention: Both primary & alternate to attend each monthly meeting in the 12-month calendar period
 - ▶ Absence notice: Members must notify District 24 hours before the date of the meeting with the reason for absence to be considered excused
 - ▶ Member Removal: After failure to attend three (3) cumulative meetings (without an approved leave of absence) regardless of an unexcused or excused absence within the 12-month calendar period

Code of Conduct

1. Be courteous, attentive and respectful to others' point of view and opinions.
2. Be punctual in arriving to the meeting, returning from breaks, respect time limits for agenda items, and plan to stay for the entire meeting. If unable to fulfill participation for the full meeting, alternate designee will be contacted so they may take over for full participation of all CSC seats.
3. Communicate openly, directly, and respectfully.
4. Participate fully in group discussions, do not deviate to side conversations, cross-talk, or distracting behaviors.
5. Be flexible and open to exchange of ideas between the group.
6. Stay on task and do not deviate attention of the group to unrelated topics.
7. Assume that all participants have positive intentions, give all members the benefit of doubt.
8. Strive to achieve a consensus in the decision-making process; if an impasse is reached then respect a simple majority vote, even if the final choice is not of your opinion.
9. Base your decision-making on what is best for the residents of the Community, do not bring a personal agenda or base your choices on what is expedient and easy, unless that is the best choice.

CAMP & CERP Importance

CAMP

- ▶ Utilize sensor data to locate hotspots & possible project locations
- ▶ Determine which areas are in higher need for emission reduction projects
- ▶ Determine which project areas are going to bring more benefits to the community

CERP

- ▶ CARB approved CERP will allow for Request for Proposals to begin
- ▶ Projects can be approved
- ▶ CSC can start using their AB617 resources to make a difference in their community's air quality
- ▶ CSC can create general project requirements (i.e. bidding concerns)
